APPALACHIAN SUMMER REGIONAL GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL

PURPOSE: To provide local gifted and high-achieving high school students with a unique and academically enriching opportunity to earn college credits in a small classroom environment.

ELIGIBILITY: Students currently enrolled in 9th, 10th, or 11th grade during the 2024-2025 school year who are either identified as gifted or academically high achieving and recommended by their high school counselor. Governor's school slots will be awarded first to students identified as gifted by their school system. The remaining spots will be awarded based on the student's high school's recommendation.

COURSES: Students will participate in a 1 credit college course at the start of each program day, SDV 100. Students will then rotate through a series of hands-on, interactive sessions from the following areas: sciences (including social sciences), arts (including Humanities), and technology (including computer technology, mathematics, and language courses). The rotation of courses is listed on this application and applicants will rank the courses listed in this brochure in order of first through sixth choice.

CREDIT: One-semester college credits will be awarded for successful course completion of the program in SDV 100 (College Success Skills) which may count as transfer credit at the discretion of the transferring colleges and can be applied towards a certificate or degree program at Wytheville Community College. Some assignments may be required of students to complete online for the SDV 100 course the week following the in-person program.

COST: Tuition is provided at no cost.

LUNCH: This is provided by the program at no cost to students and will be from local restaurants such as Chick-fil-A and Peking.

APPLICATION: Applications are due by March 21, 2025, to your high school counselor's office.

Each school is allotted spots for students for the program. Schools will rank students for acceptance based on their academic giftedness. Spaces will be filled with students identified as gifted and talented first. The remaining spots may be filled by high-achieving students who are not identified as gifted and talented. Students will be notified of their acceptance by April 11, 2025.


SELECTION: The application does not guarantee acceptance. The Governor's School does not discriminate based on race, creed, gender, or color.

DATES: Students are required to attend in person from July 14-18, 2025, at Wytheville Community College's main campus from 8:30 to 3:15 PM daily. A final program may also be required on the evening of July 18, 2025. More details will be provided before the start of the program if this is required.

TRANSPORTATION: Buses may be available to students from Carroll, Galax, Grayson, and Smyth Counties; students may also provide transportation at their own expense. If you need transportation and do not attend these high schools please contact your school counselor for further assistance.

2025 GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL COURSE OFFERINGS



The Labyrinth of Imagination:
Strategies for Paying Attention and
Developing Your Creative Self

This humanities class will explore ways students can appreciate the importance of creativity in every area of their personal lives and in any profession they choose to enter. Students will consider how to get out of the rut of the usual and see the world anew. "Make it new" as Ezra Pound said, or feel "like some watcher of the skies/when a new plant swims into this ken" as John Keats said. The world is bigger than we know. We will ask how we express ourselves and why that is important. We will explore a variety of expressive arts activities including writing and drawing, both individually and in groups. First, we want to explore strategies for "digging deeper" and then consider the best ways to express what we find with increasing precision and originality (eschewing cliches). Students will have the opportunity to encourage, advise, and collaborate. We will explore the history and mythology of the ancient labyrinth as a way to take an inner journey and cultivate mindfulness ("The awareness that arises out of paying attention on purpose, in the Present Moment, without judgment."- Jon Kabat Zin).

This course is designed to be an introduction to Political Theory and International Relations. Students will be

presented with several competing theories concerning political structure and how it relates to international affairs. The course begins in Ancient Greece and provides a sweeping view of how political theories have

changed and grown since then. Students will investigate these competing theories and participate in active and open discussions concerning the perceived pros and cons of each theory. They will also be asked to consider the term "theory" in the scientific sense and determine whether any collection of propositions concerning international politics can truly be considered a theory. Finally, they will be asked to apply several theories to

contemporary issues that impact their nation and them personally.

This course surpasses the normal curriculum offered by high school courses due to its focus on theory as well as its intense use of primary sources. The course will encourage students to conduct metacognition, in other words, students will be forced to think deeply about what they believe about government, human beings, and how they interact. They will also have the opportunity to interact with the ideas of some of the greatest thinkers in history each day. Social skills and communication will be key factors as much of the course will be based on discussion and at times debate concerning these theories. Students will need to be able to present their ideas respectfully and publicly to their peers.





Keep calm is a course that will focus on managing stress and anxiety. Students will learn how to recognize it and how to use techniques for calming their mind and body. Guided meditations will be taught which will focus on various breathing techniques as well as other calming strategies. Students will learn how to identify when their body is in Fight/Flight/Freeze mode and how to accept and manage it. Students will learn how to calm the chaos that is in our minds.
